Planned Burns Victoria

Do you want to know when planned burns will take place in your area? Find out all the information you need at Planned Burns Victoria by visiting **plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au**.

Planned burns are conducted as part of a Joint Fuel Management Program conducted by Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) and the Country Fire Authority (CFA).

Planned Burns Victoria is a service that will send you notifications about upcoming planned burns in your area so that you can stay on top of the schedule as it is known.

Final decisions to burn are made on the day, based on essential monitoring of weather conditions and local fuel moisture levels.

When you subscribe to notifications, you will receive a text and/or email as planned burns become close to being carried out. However, burns may be delayed or cancelled in the lead up and on the day depending on conditions.

Please note that the system does not include burns carried out by private landholders.

Recycle Household Chemicals

Do you have everyday household chemicals like weed killer, cleaning products, old cooking oil, or cosmetics that you no longer use? Dispose of them for free at Sustainability Victoria's Detox Your Home event at Myrtleford Transfer Station between 1pm - 3pm on Saturday 7 May 2022.

Adults are eligible for up to ten free psychology sessions either face-to-face in Bright, Mount Beauty, and Myrtleford, or over the phone.

REVIEW OF ALPINE CRC PLAN

In March 2021, the Alpine Community Recovery Committee (CRC) developed a Community Recovery Plan (CRP) to support the aspiration:

'Our communities are connected, they are prepared, they have the capacity to respond and recover, they are resilient. They are self-sufficient when needed and have the capacity to create the future they want while coping with adversities.'

The CRP (March 2021) was developed using a bottom-up approach, aligning known and pro-posed community projects with the priorities and needs identified in the community survey. This enabled the Alpine CRC to capture the granular detail at an individual community level. From here, the Alpine CRC developed a region-wide strategic view to identify issues of critical importance. This strategic approach led to the development of implementation pathways for re-covery. Both approaches were structured around the four pillars of preparedness, response, recovery, and resilience.

It is important to the Alpine CRC that we advocate for action to occur. To do this we identified implementation pathways for the twelve region-wide strategic issues identified in the CRP (March 2021). For each issue we suggested flagship projects that could address the critical underlying issues that require a coordinated, region-wide response.

The Alpine CRC believes progressing projects that address the critical underlying issues in the near term will help our communities more rapidly towards being prepared, have the capacity to respond and recover, and have the internal capacity and resilience to cope with adversities when required.

The actions the Alpine CRC has taken, and the preparation of this Progress Review, are aimed at enabling the community. The intent of this Progress Review is to capture examples of initiatives that increase the capacity of community to plan and respond to emergencies, therefore increasing community and individual resilience into the future.

Our objective in providing this Progress Review is to provide a reference for communities to develop their own preparedness and recovery activities and for agencies to use in the prioritisation of their programs.

As the community transitions from the recovery stage of the Black Summer Bushfires 2019/20 to more business as usual, the Alpine CRC will be reflecting our ongoing role and purpose in 2022. We have current projects, including an update on the status of projects in the CRP (March 2021), and a review of improving preparedness activities in a sustainable ongoing manner across the region.

This Progress Review will be made available to government agencies for reference and implementation where appropriate. It summarises what each community is doing and can be used for community strengthening, as well as a tool for community agencies to advocate for resources and support.

ONGOING PRIORITY AREAS

The Alpine CRC believe the following areas require ongoing priority:

- Changing the focus on preparedness from information provision to action. Activities and resources are needed to better connect people who are unaware they need the information.
- Addressing the possible market failure of the insurance industry. Business viability is essential for local economic resilience. Advocacy on this issue has been an ongoing priority for the Alpine CRC and other organisations in the region.
- Addressing the communication infrastructure gaps and blackspots. The introduction of the VicEmergency app after
 earlier bushfires is a welcome improvement in communications, but it only works if you have reliable connectivity.
- Advocating for firefighting equipment, training, and resources at a local level. In an emergency the local
 volunteers are the front line of the community's response. It is essential they have the equipment, resources, and
 effective training to keep them and us safe.
- **Increasing local preparedness**. A resilient community, one that is self-reliant while coping with adversities, requires planning and awareness of what is needed before an event happens.
