Preparing for next time

Knowing **who** is responsible for **what** in an emergency event can point you in the right direction for information and updates, easing some of the stress during a disaster. The **State Emergency Management Plan (SEMP)** outlines the government agencies who are responsible in an emergency in the areas of mitigation, response, relief, and recovery.

Response to an emergency occurs before, during, and immediately after the event. In Victoria, government and non-government agencies have specific responsibilities.

During emergency events, agencies are allocated as the control agency or support agency. Control agencies are primarily responsible for managing the response. Support agencies assist the control agencies.

There may be multiple control and support agencies involved in an emergency event who work closely together to coordinate the response.

RESPONSE CONTROL AGENCIES

Country Fire Authority (CFA) is a volunteer firefighting service with local-led community fire brigades. They are the control agency for fires that occur on private land in Country Area Victoria | cfa.vic.gov.au

Department of Environment, Land, Water, and Planning (DELWP) protect the natural environment, including infrastructure and heritage. They are the control agency for fires that occur in state forests, national parks, and protected public land | **delwp.vic.gov.au**

Victorian State Emergency Service (VICSES) is primarily a volunteer-based organisation. They are the control agency for storms, floods, landslides, earthquakes, and tsunamis in Victoria | ses.vic.gov.au

Victorian Police (VicPol) is responsible for evacuation and traffic management in consultation with control agencies and expert advice | **police.vic.gov.au**

Alpine Shire Council is responsible for working with the agencies listed above and others to assist the coordination of emergency management activities and resources | alpineshire.vic.gov.au

What do I do in a severe storm or flood?

The best way to stay safe in an emergency is to have a plan. Emergencies can be stressful, so having a plan can help you to think more clearly and make better decisions.

As the control agency for storms, floods, landslides, earthquakes, and tsunamis in Victoria, VICSES has resources to support Victorians to plan for emergencies at home, at work, at school, and when on holidays.

VICSES self-assessment guide

Not sure when to call for help? The following self-assessment guide provided by VICSES can help you to know when to call **132 500**:

Is anyone's life in danger? Call 000

Are you seeking emergency help in a flood or storm because:

- > A tree has fallen down and caused structural damage to your home or vehicle?
- > There is damage to your roof or it is leaking significantly?
- > A tree or large branch has fallen and is preventing you from entering or leaving your home?
- > Your property is flooded or about to flood?

If your answer is **YES**, call VICSES on **132 500**. Your request for assistance will be logged and a local volunteer may contact you for further details.

If your answer is **NO**, you may consider taking the following actions:

- > Contact your insurer to make a claim or arrange permanent repairs
- > Contact a professional tradesperson to repair damage or remove debris, if required

What's happening in your community?

The **Keep Calm Committee** started when community members in the Kiewa Valley rallied together with the Mount Beauty Neighbourhood Centre after the Black Summer Bushfires 2019/20.

In February 2021, the Keep Calm Committee organised a Red Cross RediCommunities workshop in conjunction with the local Red Cross team to develop a plan that assessed the needs of the Kiewa Valley communities and how best to support these needs.

Over two days, the Keep Calm Committee brought together community members and representatives from a range of key agencies, including Council, CFA, Ambulance Victoria, and VicPol, to exchange information and work collaboratively to discuss the needs of Kiewa Valley residents.

This workshop led to the development of resources, including a map that plots places to know in times of emergencies, and the Community Resilience Action Group (CRAG), which aims to educate members of the Kiewa Valley communities to ensure that they are prepared for the next emergency event.

WHAT HAS BEEN FUNDED?

In December 2021, the Government Hill Arts
Precinct celebrated the beauty of the natural Alpine
environments through the completion of an interactive
mural on the side of the Courthouse Shed.

The interactive mural, created by Chiltern-based artist Kirrily Anderson, encourages an appreciation for the arts while educating admirers about flora and fauna found in the Alpine region: the Omeo Gum, the Snow Gum, the Mountain Hickory Wattle, the Happy Wanderer, the Mountain Tea Tree, the Mountain Violet, and the Emperor Gum Moth.

The project also provided an exterior upgrade of the debilitating storage shed used by the Bright Courthouse and fixed the roller door, upgrading the security and functionality of the space.
