## **Smoke Alarms are Essential**

72% of fatal house fires start in living rooms and sleeping areas, says new data released by Country Fire Authority (CFA) and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV).

This has prompted fire agencies to encourage all people to consider smoke alarms as a bedroom essential, instead of relying only on smoke alarms in other parts of their homes.

Tests undertaken by Fire and Rescue NSW revealed that when a fire started in the bedroom with the door closed, the hallway smoke alarms did not activate.

Installing smoke alarms in all bedrooms, living areas, and hallways is a preparedness measure that may save lives.

#### SUMMARY OF PROGRESS REVIEW

Have you accessed the Alpine CRC's Progress Review of our Community Recovery Plan yet?

In March 2021, the Alpine CRC developed a Plan to support the aspiration:

'Our communities are connected, they are prepared, they have the capacity to respond and recover, they are resilient. They are self-sufficient when needed and have the capacity to create the future they want while coping with adversities.'

Earlier this year, the Alpine CRC released a Progress Review of the Plan, which aims to provide a reference for communities to develop their own preparedness and recovery activities, as well as for agencies to use in the prioritisation of their programs.

#### **COMMUNITY COMMUNICATIONS**

The Alpine CRC has identified communication as a major gap in the ability of the local community to prepare for emergencies and natural disasters.

Despite the large volume of information provided by government and emergency services agencies on preparedness activities, this information is not always sought, or perceived as easy to access.

The Alpine CRC believes there is an opportunity to improve communication and increase the uptake in community resilience activities. The Alpine CRC has developed the Alpine Community Communications Network and recommends a pilot program to trial the concept.

More information about the Network will be shared over the coming months.

Alpine Health's Alpine Natural Disaster Recovery Service is a free and confidential support service that is designed for adults who feel as though they have been impacted by the recent events affecting our communities.

Adults are eligible for up to ten free psychology sessions either face-to-face in Bright, Mount Beauty, and Myrtleford, or over the phone.
