## **PREPARING FOR NEXT TIME**

As emergencies can bring about unforeseen and sometimes immediate changes, it is important to consider potential road closures and road diversions when developing your emergency plan. It can also be useful to know who is responsible for what in an emergency event so that you know what to expect.

The **State Emergency Management Plan (SEMP)** outlines the government agencies who are responsible for a variety of actions in different emergencies.

During emergencies, an **Incident Controller (IC)** controls the operational elements of the response and leads multiagency planning by seeking resources from control agencies and response support agencies.

The IC is responsible for directing the operations of the control agencies and support agencies during an emergency. All agencies act at the discretion of the IC.

> During bushfires, road closures are determined by the IC in consultation with the control agencies, which are Country Fire Authority (CFA), Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV), and Department of Environment, Land, Water, and Planning (DELWP).

> During **floods and storms**, road closures are determined by the IC in consultation with the control agency, which is **Victorian State Emergency Service (VICSES)**.

> Victorian Police (VicPol) will manage the traffic management points on behalf of the IC.

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#### **Emergency Recovery Victoria**

Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) was established in January 2020 in response to the Black Summer Bushfires. In June 2021, BRV coordinated the recovery of flood and storm affected regions across Victoria. In 2022, BRV officially transitioned into **Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV)**, a permanent agency responsible for leading long-term recovery following all major emergencies.

The transition to ERV responds to the **Inspector-General for Emergency Management's (IGEM) inquiry into the 2019-20 bushfire season**, which recommends that an all-emergencies agency is established to improve state-wide recovery.

ERV coordinated recovery efforts in conjunction with impacted communities, all levels of government, agencies, and industry, including not-for-profit organisations. By doing so, they follow through with their focus on community-led recovery.

Australian Government Disaster Recovery Allowance | Short term payments to support eligible people in the Alpine Shire and Falls Creek who have lost income as a direct result of the Bogong Landslide and Victoria Floods starting in October 2022. Victorian Government Personal Hardship Assistance Program | Eligible people are able to apply for one-off emergency relief payments for immediate and essential needs from 3 November 2022. Visit **emergencypayments.dffh.vic.gov.au**.

Victorian Government Small Business Immediate Flood Relief Program | Eligible businesses are able to apply for one-off grants of \$5,000 to cover immediate expenses as a result of significant damage to their place of business, business assets, stock, or equipment. ## WHAT HAS BEEN FUNDED?

Last month in October 2022, Council and the Alpine Community Recovery Committee (CRC) held the inaugural Redi Expo! in conjunction with the Myrtleford Show.

The Redi Expo! saw agencies come together to raise awareness of emergency mitigation, response, recovery, and resilience, with the aim of encouraging showgoers to know their role in times of disaster. The State Emergency Management Plan (SEMP) states that there is shared responsibility when it comes to preparing for emergencies, meaning that everyone has a role to play.

Agency staff at the Redi Expo! gave out showbags to showgoers, filled with safety pamphlets, colouring-in sheets, pencils, lanyards, magnets, and more.

The Alpine CRC, Council, and DELWP also worked together to develop buckets to give to campers to douse their campfires, raising awareness of fire safety.

Despite the rain, the inaugural Redi Expo! saw good numbers and is excited to continue raising awareness amongst the community to raise resilience and ensure our region is prepared for the next disaster.
