From Our Mayor



A message from Alpine Shire Council Mayor John Forsyth.

Independent Inquiry Into 2019-20 Victorian Fire Season - Phase 2

Inspector-General for Emergency Management (IGEM), Tony Pearce, is conducting the independent Inquiry into the 2019–20 Victorian Fire Season. The Inquiry's Terms of Reference for Phase 2 include an examination of:

- the effectiveness of immediate relief and recovery work and arrangements
- the creation of Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV), and the National Bushfire Recovery Agency (NBRA), and how they work together.

IGEM invites community members from the Alpine Shire and Alpine Resorts to provide feedback on the delivery and effectiveness of recovery activities 12 months since the fires in at the following meetings:

Community Event Grant

Community and sporting groups are invited to apply for Round 2 of the Bushfire Recovery Community Event Funding Program, delivered by Alpine Shire Council with support from the Australian and Victorian governments under the Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangement.

Grants are available for up to \$5,000 to support events that bring bushfire affected communities together, build resilience, and raise awareness of support services. LER Grant Funding - Round 1

The first round of the Bushfire Recovery Victoria (LER) grants were announced, with \$189,000 allocated to the Alpine region to improve the surface and drainage on the Possum loop track and Dargo lookout trail within the Mount Hotham Alpine Resort. Round 2 of the LER grants offer a \$14.6 million tranche, which opens Monday, 15 March, 2021. ALPINE CRC SURVEY

We heard from 327 people, and something that stood out straight away amongst the results is the level of care and concern people have for each other in our community. People also expressed this keen enthusiasm for gathering and connection. For some, this was about debriefing and checking in with each other now restrictions have lifted. For others, this is seen as being essential for community strengthening and building resilience.

The survey demonstrated that the community have identified a number of priorities that they believe are imperative to bushfire preparedness, response, recovery, and resilience. To address these priorities, the Alpine CRC will meet with relevant agencies and feedback their responses to the community through this newsletter as Community Priorities.

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COMMUNITY PRIORITIES: DELWP

The survey suggested that our communities regard environmental protection and management as the number one priority for future bushfire preparation. So much so, that this priority was ranked amongst the highest across all our communities. The Alpine CRC met with DELWP to find out how they have been addressing this priority. - replacing boundary fencing on both public and private land
- repairing 490km of firebreaks on public land while managing plant species and erosion
- repairing 440km of roads and numerous bridges
- looking to divert hazardous trees to community depots for firewood
- managing and repairing waterways by removing barriers for native fish to swim upstream
- reseeding 6000ha of Alpine Ash using existing seed banks
- assessing and rehabilitating the long-footed potoroo, spotted-tree frog, and Macquarie perch
- focusing on high-threat weeds, including broom in the Buckland Valley and willow in Buffalo River
- trying to secure funding for other weeds, including blackberries as it is acknowledged that they are an extreme issue
- culling 3000 pests animals in eastern Victoria, including deer, goats, pigs, and foxes
- undergoing work at Mt Buffalo, particularly around the chalet, and at the Tawonga Caravan Park
 - helping to establish stand-alone power systems so that communities can be more sufficient when in need of power
