

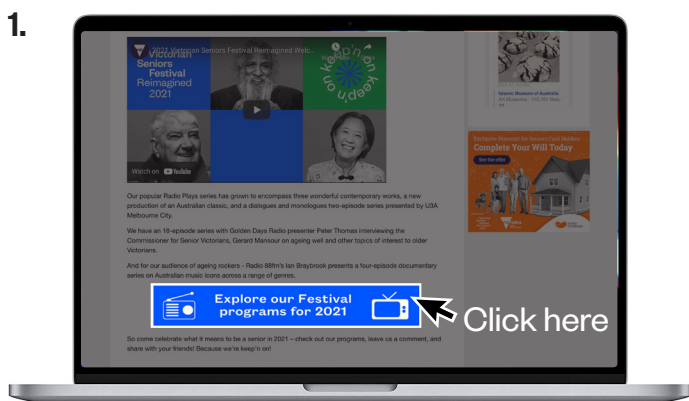


How to watch and listen to Victorian Seniors Festival video and radio programs

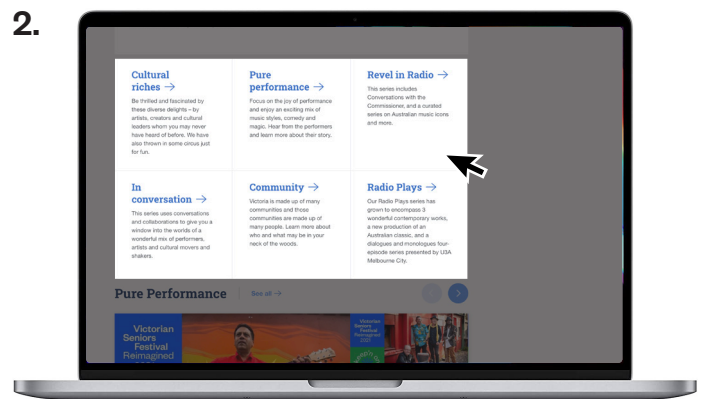

Once you are there, simply scroll down the page until you see 'Explore our Festival programs for 2021' button and click to enter.

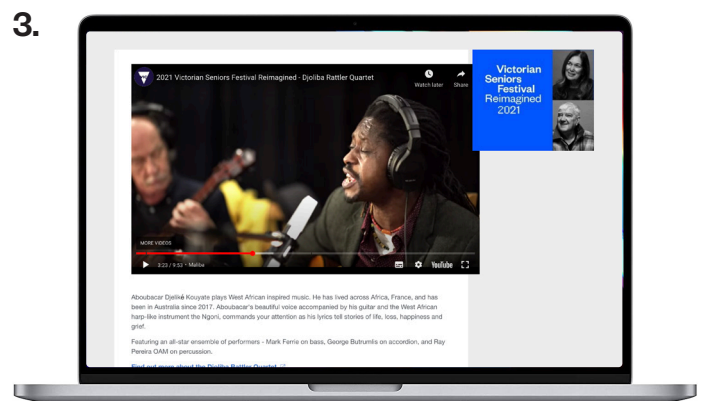


When the page opens scroll down to the categories menu and select:
